My Dear Mr Marseilles:

I have your note of June 2d.

I am quite curious about the photograph of my father which you describe as representing him sharpening a pencil for my youngest brother. I never saw such a picture, and I supposed I had seen everything. Is it not rather a photograph representing him as looking at a photograph album upon his knee, and my brother "Tad" standing by him looking over it? I have seen the photograph to which I refer published in various ways, for instance, describing it as "President Lincoln reading the bible to his son". It was a photograph album in the photographer's operating room.

It is quite impossible for me to furnish you

nothing of the kind myself, and do not believe in the authenticity of any wood designated as having come from any home of my father. If, however, you mean a piece of wood from my father's residence in Springfield, - that is of course still standing, but I do not own it any longer, it having been presented by me many years ago to the State of Illinois. It is now in charge of a Board of Trustees, of which the Governor of the State is the Chairman.
